Words of Wisdom from a Stage 3 <u>colorectal</u> <u>cancer</u> Survivor - <u>Eden Stotsky-Himelfarb</u>, BS, BSN, RN, ONN-CG:



Now is the time to think about screening for colorectal cancer. If you are 45 or older and have not had a colonoscopy, don't take a chance with colorectal cancer - schedule an appointment today. If you have a family history of polyps or colorectal cancer, don't take a chance with colorectal cancer, schedule an appointment today. A colonoscopy can dramatically reduce your risk of colorectal cancer. It's better to talk about a colonoscopy now, than to talk about colorectal cancer later. If you have any questions, you can always call Eden at 443-287-9045. (You can schedule a colonoscopy at Johns Hopkins at 443-997-1870.)

Reach out to Child Life Services!

Many hospitals which care for children and youth have a team of <u>Child Life specialists</u>, who are trained to support the youngest patients and their family members. The Johns Hopkins Hospital has a <u>robust program</u> as do other area medical centers, including <u>University of Maryland</u> and <u>Children's</u> <u>National</u> in Washington, DC. They generally serve both inpatients and outpatients in treatment.
