Leukemia & Lymphoma – Leukemia, a blood cancer, is the most common cancer among children, yet occurs more often in older adults. Lymphoma is a broad term for those cancers which begin in the cells of the lymph system. Click on the links above for info.

Prostate – Did you know this is the most common cancer? Usually slow growing, it is the second leading cause of cancer death among men.


Thyroid — Different types of cancer cells can grow in the thyroid gland at the base of the throat near the windpipe. Click on the <u>link</u> to learn much more.


Connect with someone who cares! Whether you are seeking support as an adult cancer patient or caregiver ... or you are looking for a way to provide support as a trained mentor to
