Focus on Advance Care Planning!

April 16 was <u>National Healthcare Decisions Day</u> ... but that was not the only day to address this important document. You can name the person you would like to make medical decisions for you, if you were not able to do so your-self, and you can direct the kinds of treatments you would want if you were unable to speak for yourself.

- Everyone age 18+ needs an Advance Directive.
- You do not need an Attorney to complete the document.
- You do not need a Notary to sign in Maryland.
- You can change your Advance Directive any time.
- Maryland provides an <u>electronic</u> version.


